The GBCSC 150th Medal - Anniversary of Canada's Confederation

Back in the early part of the year 2017, Henry Nienhuis created a program for the RCNA to create Medals to celebrate the 150 TH Anniversary of Canada's Confederation. Henry proposed this program to get member clubs involved into creating a set of medals to celebrate the event. At the time, Henry felt that he would get 12 clubs involved for this program. In all, at the beginning, 27 member clubs got involved with this program. 27 clubs, plus the RCNA would create a 28-medal set of medals. The idea was to have all the medals minted by July 2017. This was achieved, and 50 sets were made up and presented in a 2-tray wooden box. The sets were sold at the RCNA Boucherville —Convention in July 2017. The sets went for \$300.00. 45 of the 50 sets were sold at the convention. As president of the GBCSC at the time, I felt this was the perfect time for the GBCSC to get involved. I wanted to do a medal for the club and with this RCNA program, made it easy to pitch to our club. The cost to do the medal was half the price, for we only needed to do one die, not 2. After everything was approved, we ordered for the club, 50 medals in copper and 30 medals in silver. There is a total of 100 medals in copper. The RCNA ordered separately from the club's order, 50 medals in copper for the medal sets offered for sale at the RCNA Convention. We sold the copper medals for \$15 and the silver medals for \$50. We had a complete sell out of medals. The set that was sold by the RCNA had space for 32 medals. The set only had 28 medals at the time. This left 4 empty slots. In the fall of 2017, 2 more clubs wanted to be part of the medal program. Niagara Falls Coin Club and Champlain Coin Club. I had a hand in getting the Champlain Coin Club added to the program.







There were 2 mints involved with the medal program. Pressed Metal of Vancouver and the Mississauga Mint. We chose to use the Mississauga mint for 2 reasons. The main reason was that the Mississauga mint was more reasonably priced, and the minted process is sharper that Pressed Metal. With addition of the 2 other clubs that joined the program, this filled 2 of the empty slots in the wooden case. Now we still have 2 empty slots. The Halifax Regional Coin Club ordered their medals from Pressed Metal, Pressed medal used a wrong die and sent 50 incorrect medals to the HRCC. The HRCC notified Pressed Metal of the mistake and Pressed Metal said keep the error medals and they will send 50 of the correct medals to them and they did. The error medal has a place in the set. Now we have one slot left. The Boucherville club in turn did 2 different medals. An official one and one unofficial medal in copper of which there is only 10 minted. This medal has a place in the set and if you are fortune enough to get one of these medals, it has a place in the set. To have a complete set in copper, there are 32 medals to have a complete set of the RCNA 150 TH Medal Program set.

Thanks to Jeff Wilson for all his time and effort to make this happen as well as his dedication to the Georgian Bay Coin and Stamp Club and made the GBCSC Coin reality. The very informative presentations he has put together giving club members unique views of the inter-nation coin world with his affiliation with the RCNA.

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
