News of the April 2021 Meeting

Secretary/Treasurer Doug McGarvey read the minutes of the March meeting which was adopted as read by Rob Durrant and Bill Beattie.

Topics discussed included following up on the youth program by the ONA, Chris Liantzakis has contacted the ONA and arranged for 20 to 25 kits for young collectors. Murray Smith suggested that our club could contribute some of our bulk coins to the ONA's youth program. Murray is going to pass on a donation of foreign coins to our club from someone who was selling off a collection.

Murray has several ancient and medieval coins available for sale.

Bill Beattie said the ICCS graded coins will be picked up by Rob Durrant the following week. If anyone needs supplies or catalogues to let him know.

Rob Morrison was looking for the latest colourized coins from the RCM which led to a discussion about

the latest issues of coins from the RCM. Bill Beattie will be selling individual colourized and regular dollars from rolls as well as first strikes for 2021.

Ron Cheek complimented our club's newsletter and Rob Durrant mentioned the contributions from Judy Blackman and Scott Douglas.

Ron Cheek displayed an English penny with 1916 counter stamped on it and its connection to the Irish Easter Uprising in 1916. Murray Smith suggested that it could also be a challenge coin as WWI was ongoing in 1916. This led to a discussion on challenge coins and bills and other counter stamped coins.

Jeff Wilson initiated a discussion about medals when he showed his George Williams medal that was awarded by the French Consulate. We also saw examples of medals issued in Montreal and NYC to commemorate Edward the Prince of Wales visit in the 1860s.

Chris Liantzakis displayed his design for the 60th anniversary medal

Rob Durrant presented a Power Point presentation from the London Numismatic Society about the Molson's Bank from 1837 to 1925 after which the meeting closed.

Did You Know?

Did you know that in 1958 Canadian Tire money, Canada's other official currency, made its debut?

It was introduced in 1958, and was inspired by Muriel Billes, the wife of Canadian Tire's co-founder and first president, Alfred J. Billes, as a response to the promotional giveaways that many gas companies offered



at the time. It was only available at Canadian Tire gas bars but was so successful that, in 1961, it was extended to the retail stores as well, and has become the most successful loyalty program in Canadian retail history. The print on the 'notes' refers to them as "money bonus coupons".

In 1958, five different denominations (composed of 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents, 50 cents, and \$1) were issued. The revision of 1962 included the introduction of four lower values (1 to 4 cents), and 12 higher denominations, including 35 and 60 cents. A sequence of six denominations was introduced in 1985 including the 3 cents, 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents, 40 cents, 50 cents, and \$1.

A \$2 note was added in 1989, and the 3 cents was dropped in 1991.

Elizabeth Wyn Wood was member #64 of the coin club.

Collecting Straits Settlements – Quick Primer

If you are looking for a collecting interest outside of Canadian or America coins have a look at collecting the Straits Settlements. There is a lot of history here from the East India Company to the Current Malaysian coinage of today.






Straits Settlements

It started with the three separate East India Company settlements. Penang (rented, 1786), Singapore

(bought, 1819 and 1824) and Malacca (ceded by the Netherlands in an exchange, 1824) were, after 1826, administered collectively by the Company, and later the Indian Government, as Straits Settlements. In 1867 the settlements were made a Crown Colony. Labuan, which became part of Singapore Settlement in 1907, was part of a fourth separate settlement in 1912.



In brief, the three Settlements of Penang, Malacca and Singapore were amalgamated to form the Straits Settlements in 1826. The capital was Penang until 1836, when it was transferred to Singapore. In 1858, British Government took over the Straits Settlements. During this period, the Straits Settlements was under control of the Government of British India. A new issuance of coins with the inscription of "India Straits" was released in 1862.

Straits Settlements coins first issued in 1871

- There are three series of Straits Settlements coins issued between 1871 and 1935 with the inscription of
 "Straits Settlements". These series of coins were issued under the reign of Queen Victoria (1837 -1901),
 King Edward VII (1901-1910) and King George V (1910-1936).
- In 1867, the Straits Settlements were transferred to the Imperial Government in London and on the same year the Straits Settlements became a Crown Colony. The first series of Straits Settlements coins was then issued in 1871. This series of Queen Victoria Straits Settlements coins was issued in 1/4 Cent, 1/2 Cent, 1 Cent, 5 Cents, 10 Cents, 20 Cents and 50 cents.

These coins were released from 1871 to 1901.







1/4, 1/2 and 1 Cent coins were made by copper and bronze depending on their issuance year.
