Our club needs your artistic support. We need a design for the reverse side of our 60th anniversary medal. Please forward your designs to Rob, our club webmaster.

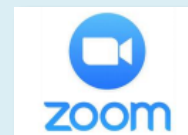
Also take the time to think about our future face to face meetings. Can you offer a suggestion or two about speakers, items for discussion or presentations that you would like to see or present to the club?

Murray adjourned the meeting.



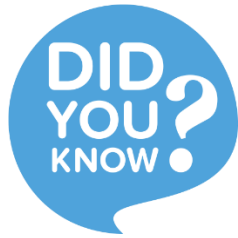

The World's Biggest Coin Conventions

Asia's biggest coin convention - China International Coin Expo

The market there is huge - as are its coin conventions. The biggest coin convention in Asia and the one that attracts the highest number of visitors in the world is said to be the China International Coin Expo. **In 2018 about 30,000 visitors and 240 exhibitors** flocked to the China National Convention Center. Originally scheduled for September 10-12, was postponed until October 29-31.



Europe's biggest coin convention - World Money Fair in Berlin

The World Money Fair in Berlin has been considered one of the most important coin conventions in the world. It may well be the biggest one in Europe, too. **In 2019, a total of about 15,000 visitors and 330 exhibitors** travelled to Germany's capital.

America's biggest coin convention - The World's Fair of Money

The World's Fair of Money which is organized by the American Numismatic Association (ANA) is supposedly the biggest coin convention in the USA and the one that attracts the highest number of exhibitors. **In 2018, around 9,939 visitors, 400 dealers and representatives** came to Philadelphia to attend the convention. The next convention is in Chicago in August of 2022.

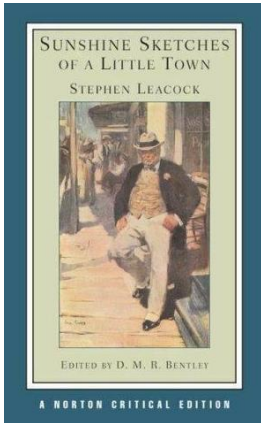

An Orillia Wooden Coin Commemorates Two Centennial Anniversaries

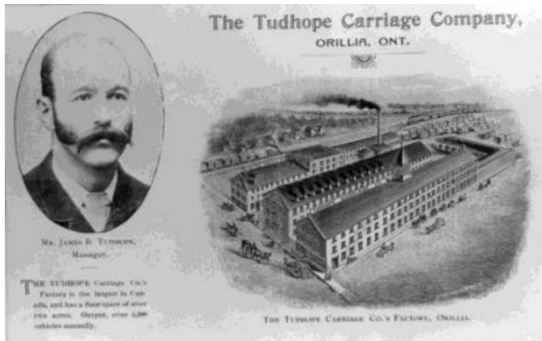

This wood was issued in 1912 to commemorate two centennial events. The events are 100-hundred anniversary of the first Tudhope Car to come at the line in Orillia, and the first release of Stephen Leacock's most famous book, Sunshine Sketches of a Little Town, which was a series of stories based in Mariposa, a small town on the shore of Lake Wissanotti. Sunshine Sketches of a Little Town was later adapted for a Canadian television series in 1952. An original 1912 Tudhope car was on display in 2012 at the Leacock Museum, and two other models were also available for viewing in Orillia during the festivities. I was unable to determine if the wood was sold as a fundraiser, or as an admission ticket, or a gift shop souvenir. The museum event was part of a series of cultural, annual car show, and family events Orillia held during a week in the summer of 2012.



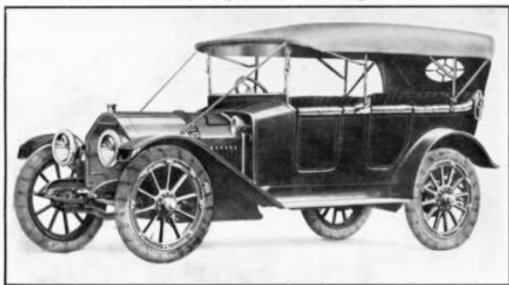
This 45 mm wood, with both sides black foil hot-stamped, is listed in **Norm Belsten's** catalogue as 5650-023. The quantity produced is unknown, but likely exceeded 1,000 pieces.



In the early-1900s, there were many Canadian car makers, with most of them failing in a short period of time.

The Tudhope Carriage Co. was founded in the 1800s by William Tudhope, a blacksmith and wheelwright. By the early-1900s, his son James B. Tudhope recognized carriages would be replaced by vehicles. He decided to build a car of his own, and for its twin-cylinder air-cooled engine, two-speed transmission and chain drive, turned to W.H. McIntyre Co. of Auburn (Indiana, USA), incorporating them into a buggy-like high-wheeler with a rudimentary body that was being tested by the end of the summer of 1908.

1913 TUDHOPE, 6-Cylinder, 7-Passenger, \$2,500.



Rub a lead pencil or edge of coin over the lines of the TUDHOPE above and blank space beneath the running board and see how to eliminate every possibility of SKIDDING.

Production began soon after and Tudhope-McIntyres, priced at about \$550CAD, were sold across Canada through the company's network of carriage dealers. Bell Telephone Co. was an early customer.

In 1909, a fire gutted the factory, and James targeted a more modern car and retooling of the new plant, so he negotiated an agreement with Metzger Motor Car Co. of Detroit (Michigan, USA) to produce a version of its modern Everitt 30. The new Tudhope Motor Co. was pushing out 1911 models at about \$1,500 each, under the price of the

Everitt 30 and Everitt-Tudhope names, and were powered by four-cylinder and six-cylinder engines. The following year, Tudhope parted with Metzger as Metzger was victim of a takeover. In Tudhope 1913 models offered upgrades such as electric lighting and starters, but the high selling price was a deterrent to gaining a share in the marketplace. Sadly, this would lead towards the end of a legacy. By 1916, Tudhope Motor Co. was bought by an American company McLaughling Carriage Works (headed by the Studebaker Plant Manager, Frank Fisher), and the brand name changed from Tudhope to Fisher, although the cars were still built in Orillia. The First World War cause the end of car production as the production plants were needed to produce ambulances and other needs of the war effort. In total, the plant in Orillia from when it first opened until the end of car production, saw over 500 Tudhope-McIntyres and about 2,000 Tudhope cars built. The fact three of the Tudhope cars still exist in Orillia today, is largely due to the efforts of the Smith family (John Smith was a vintage car enthusiast). The three cars have ownership links to the Tudhope family and the Orillia Heritage Centre.

1. **c) Discovery of insulin 100th Anniversary.** In 1921, the collaboration of Frederick Banting, Charles Best, James Collip and John Macleod led to the isolation and purification of insulin and offered a life-saving treatment to people whose lives would have previously been cut short by diabetes.



2. **b) The Canadian gold rush 125th Anniversary.** The reverse design is visible on one or both ends of each roll so you can easily view the red-and-white pictorial representation of *Ēdhä Dädhëchq* (Moosehide Slide)— an important cultural symbol seen on an iconic drum held by Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in leader Chief Isaac in historical photos.



3. **d) 10 cent - 100th Anniversary of the launch of Bluenose.** From "tree to sea" Bluenose takes 97-days to build and is named after a popular nickname given to Nova Scotians. On March 26th, the most famous ship in Canadian history is launched in Lunenburg Harbour. (November release by RCM)



4. **d) 50 cents** - This coin commemorates the 100th anniversary of Canada's coat of arms. George V proclaimed this in 1921. This coin has the date 2021 on the reverse. The 1937 fifty cent piece was the first coin to feature the new coat of arms image and the George VI effigy is on that coin, so it reappears here on this commemorative 50 cent coin.



5. **a) Signing of the UN Charter.** It's the 75th Anniversary of our nation's role as a Founding Member and a contributor to world peace.



6. **b) Armistice 100th Anniversary.** On November 11, 1918, Allied and German forces met in France to sign the Armistice, paving the way for peace and ending the First World War.



7. **d) Birth of Bill Reid** – The artwork appearing on the 2020 \$2 Circulation Coin - 100th Anniversary of the Birth of Bill Reid is known as Xhuwaji, Haida Grizzly Bear. Reid painted it in 1988 on a ceremonial drum belonging to the Sam family of Ahousat, British Columbia. He later adapted the design for reproduction on silkscreen prints, with proceeds benefitting the Artists for Kids Trust, which benefits children's art education in British Columbia through the sale of original prints created by professional artists.



8. **a) Anniversary of the Allied Victory** - The \$2 circulation coin commemorating the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War is inspired by the 1943-45 Victory Nickels designed by Thomas Shingles. The "V" for Victory was, at the time, a rallying call to support the war effort from coast to coast to coast.

The words VICTORY and VICTOIRE appear on the outer ring, as does a message engraved in Morse code. "We win when we work willingly" first appeared on wartime Victory Nickels.
