Murray gave his presentation on Condor tokens issued privately by business during the Industrial Revolution in the United Kingdom, to address a shortage of coins.

Looking Back at the Champlain Coin Club!

This month we celebrate our 60th Anniversary! Join our June 9th meeting to see some of our milestones over the years.

In 1962 the Champlain Coin Club was formed, with the help of the Woodville Club, on June 9th at the old Y.M.C.A. in Orillia by Founder and President - Howard Johnson.

Meetings were held the third Saturday of each month. Adult membership began at one dollar per year. In 1964 it was decided in beginning with July, the club will meet the first Thursday of each month which we still do today. Bob Swan wrote first news bulletin on January 18th that year. Meetings were changed to St. David's Church on James Street Orillia on September 2nd, 1976.

Over the years the Champlain Coin Club took part in many activities from the Orillia Santa Clause parade (1968), supporting the purchase of an artificial kidney machine (1971), many early coins shows, and started our first annual Scouts night in 1993. We have had many guest speakers join us over the years, including Mr J.E. Charleton. At June 1996 meeting, we saw a film on the life of Emanual Hahn and Elizabeth Wyn Wood . Elizabeth Wyn Wood was member #64 of the coin club.

Looking forward to continuing the legacy and sharing our hobby. Happy 60th Birthday Champlain Coin Club!
