News of the September 2022 Meeting

President Murray Smith opened the first meeting for our 61st year by welcoming back our members and asking for thirty seconds of silence for our late Queen. Murray exclaimed that we had a lot to discuss tonight.

Chris drew the 50/50 for \$11.50 and the winner of was Dan Horne.

Bill Beattie is asking members for coins to grade with the ICCS. The price for grading has increased to \$9 plus tax but now includes any type of coin including gold, foreign and tokens. The deadline for submissions is 31 October. If you have coins, you can notify Bill and he will arrange for the coins to be dropped off at various locations including Orillia and of course the next meeting. They should be ready for January and a new order form is available on the ICCS website.

Murray and Bill Beattie made us aware of the RCM alloy recovery program that was recently mentioned in the news. This program will result in most of the coins prior to 2000 being removed from circulation and making them scarcer and more valuable.

Bill also reminded us that he will be taking orders for the latest coin catalogues coming out soon. The club will be ordering the latest Canadian Banknotes catalogue for the library.

Chris updated us on the library and has proposed creating a t-shirt with our club logo on it which he will sell for \$20 dollars each donating \$5 from each sale to the library fund.

Murray displayed our latest acquisition, 2 new books on grading donated by Rob Durrant available to borrow. He also asked members who didn't yet have a name tag to request them through Rob Durrant.

Rob Durrant told us about attending the recent ONA Convention where the convention medallion featured a

portrait of Bill English. Bill is a founding member of the ONA as well as a member of our club.

Next was a special draw for two General Brock 25 cent pieces sign by the artist then there was the regular prize table draws. This was followed by a short break.

After the break Secretary/Treasurer Doug McGarvey read the minutes of the June 2022 meeting which were adopted as read by Carol Casselman and Linda Huggins. Birthdays for September included Sandra Bishop and Joan Penley. Doug had received correspondence from the ONA regarding our renewal and insurance. A motion to renew our membership and insurance for \$135 was carried.

Rick Fox brought us up to date on using the club house at Big Cedar Estate for our December social. The room is \$50 with a refundable deposit of \$100. There is capacity of 100 and a motion was passed to have the social at Big Cedar, potluck and we can bring our significant others. Doug will follow up with the church to see if we have to pay rent for December if we are meeting someone else. Details such as the gift exchange will be included in the newsletter before the event.

Rob Durrant talked about the upcoming coin show the club is hosting in Gravenhurst. It will be on Sunday, 23 October, 10am to 3pm at the Muskoka Discovery Centre. The rent for the centre is \$500. which should be recovered from the fees charged for the tables.

We did our show and tell which was started by Jodi Pudifin who displayed her collection of Queen Elizabeth memorabilia including correspondence she received from her late majesty. Doug McGarvey showed off his first prize ribbon he received in 1967 for a coin display at school and how it motivated him in the hobby. Jeff Wilson displayed his advance copy of the medal for the Halifax Regional Coin Club show on the 15th of October. Carol Casselman showed her collection of necklaces including one with the queen.

Chris Liantzakis had a token which he found on a pair of shorts he was getting rid of. Mike Cole showed his rocking horse Crown which was an art deco stylization of the St. George and the dragon design on the 1935 UK crown.

Murray Smith brought in a coin dated 1300 from Bohemia featuring Wenceslas as in the Christmas carol.

Finishing the evening was another active auction that included a bottle of maple syrup donated by Phil Abbot.

Murray closed the meeting and said to watch for updates in the newsletter.

As a reminder--Place your coin(s), your completed, signed and dated form including your cheque for the total amount payable to ICCS in an envelope or small box with your name printed on the outside or visible through a plastic bag.



Please also honour any appropriate distancing or wear a mask if requested at any of these drop-off locations. It will be very much appreciated.

FINAL STEP please advise Bill Beattie that you have dropped off coins at one of the above locations and how many coins. This will help us to arrange pick up at these locations.

Thank you for your continued co-operation and good luck in getting the highest grades.

The deadline is October 31, 2022 so when you are ready to submit your coins return the completed form, and a cheque or cash for the total amount--all payable to ICCS. Please advise Bill Beattie so we can arrange for your delivery at a Club meeting or to a local club member as before. The uncertified coins will be delivered to ICCS in early November and the certified coins will likely be available for pick up in Late January 2023.

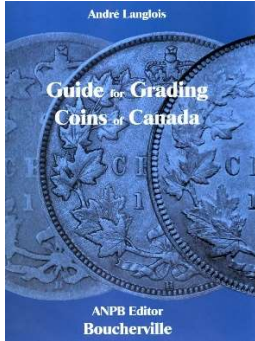

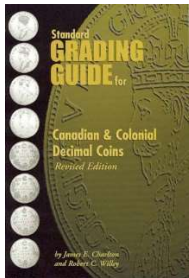
